Dirait-on, a movement from Les Chansons Des Roses, written in 1993, is one of his most popular compositions. With a nod to French poet, Rainer Maria Rilke, Lauridsen composed Dirait-on as a chanson populaire, a lovely melody with a lyrical refrain.

Lenggang Kangkung

Traditional folk song, Malay Archipelago, arr. Tracy Wong

iSing Commission, World Premiere

Lenggang Kangkung is a rhythmic arrangement of a well-known folksong from the Malay archipelago featuring simple, catchy, and repetitive melodies. Folksongs from this region are usually lively and festive; they introduce new melodies and encourage children to sing freely. The lyrics often tell a story or bear advice intended for young people, although some are humorously written and are meant to entertain. Lenggang Kangkung suggests the story of a person moving along in a carefree manner (lenggang), like water spinach (kangkung) swaying or dancing in the paddy field. The text speaks to the carefree nature of folks who work in the fields – even though they have a simple life, they are proud of their work and are content with what they have.

Up the Crane Tower

Up the Crane Tower is a well known poem, often taught to children in China. The Yellow River mentioned in the text is the second largest river of China. Li is a Chinese mile. The poem message: There is no limit to knowledge; one should keep studying. Up the Crane Tower is the first of six movements in Chen Yi's Chinese Poems for Six Girls' Choruses, which introduces ancient Chinese texts to new audiences.

Where the Insects Cry

Santa Ratniece (text from Japan)

iSing Commission, World Premiere at ACDA National Convention 2023, Cincinnati, OH

Latvian composer Santa Ratniece's work Where the Insects Cry was inspired by two of Japan's most famous writers. Ryōkan was a Japanese, Buddhist monk who spent the majority of his life living in simplicity and solitude at the base of Mount Kugami. Despite his reclusivity, he became well-known during his lifetime for his Zen poems and calligraphy. Murasaki Shikibu is the author of The Tales of Genji, said to be the world's first novel. Both authors describe the subtleties of nature and the passing of time. Santa uses extended vocal and cello techniques to create a fascinating, immersive soundscape.


Waga yado ni uete sodateshi momokusa wa kaze no kokoro ni makasu nari keri

In twilight crossing over Mount Kugami at the crest I heard the cry of a deer.




Arirang

Traditional Korean, arr. Hyo-won Woo

"Arirang is a popular form of Korean folk song and the outcome of collective contributions made by ordinary Koreans throughout generations. Essentially a simple song, it consists of the refrain 'Arirang, arirang, arariyo' and two simple lines, which differ from region to region. While dealing with diverse universal themes, the simple musical and literary composition invites improvisation, imitation and singing in unison, encouraging its acceptance by different musical genres. Experts estimate the total number of folk songs carrying the title 'Arirang' at some 3,600 variations belonging to about sixty versions. A great virtue of Arirang is its respect for human creativity, freedom of expression and empathy. Everyone can create new lyrics, adding to the song's regional, historical and genre variations, and cultural diversity. Arirang is universally sung and enjoyed by the Korean nation. At the same time, an array of practitioners of regional versions, including local communities, private groups and individuals, actively lead efforts for its popularization and transmission, highlighting the general and local characteristics of individual versions. Arirang is also a popular subject and motif in diverse arts and media, including cinema, musicals, drama, dance and literature. It is an evocative hymn with the power to enhance communication and unity among the Korean people, whether at home or abroad."



And weeping sadly in silence he buries his face in his little folded arm.


The Hedgehog






Skylar Burnett

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


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
